## ...Changing Lives For More Than Six Decades!

### 1953 - Aurora's first bookmobile was borrowed from the State of Illinois.

"We were recently informed by the East Side Board of Education that the room which houses our East Branch Library would be needed for school purposes...our Board has had a bookmobile in mind for several years and this would appear to be the right time to try one."

## 1957 - This bookmobile replaced the borrowed bookmobile.

"This first APL traveling branch was not immediately recognizable to all Aurorans. The first monthly report told of a lady who entered the bookmobile, handed a dime to the librarian on board and asked to be let off at Fifth Street."

### In 2017, new graphics were added to the bookmobile purchased in 2003.




Why now is the time: Aurora's current bookmobile, put into service in early 2003, has 120,000+ miles. Repairs are interrupting service. To date, it has been off-road 31 days in 2019. APL has taken excellent care of the bookmobile and it has served Aurora well; however, it is time to replace it. Aurora Public Library's operating budget is comprised mainly of property taxes (2.9% of your property taxes is allocated to APL). While APL will fund ongoing operations, if this service is to continue, the Aurora Public Library Foundation must raise \$400,000 through donations, grants and fundraising events to purchase a new digital bookmobile.



"There is something inspiring about doing a job where the customer gets excited when you show up to do your work. When we arrive, the children run to the bookmobile to get the latest book in their favorite series. Nursing home residents wait patiently for us to arrive and open our doors."

## The Bookmobile Serves Many In Our City

### And so will the digital bookmobile!



The digital bookmobile will build upon early literacy learning to expand knowledge in the areas of digital, media, visual, data and health literacy.

### The digital bookmobile will primarily serve:

- Residents in outlying areas
- People with disabilities
- Immigrants to welcome them to America
- Homeless families, children and individuals

### **Educators**

Bookmobile services extend educators' resources for home, public and private schooling. When school is not in session and especially in the summer, children experience what educators call "the summer slide." Children from lower income households, slide the furthest (Erikson Institute).

### The digital bookmobile will serve:

### Children/Families from lower income households

#### According to SPARK (Strong Prepared And Ready for Kindergarten):

- Aurora is one of Illinois' most under-served communities for early learning services
- Only one in four children in Aurora have the skills they need to be successful in school
- 20,000 children in Aurora are age five and younger and...
  - Forty-four percent live at or below 185% of the federal poverty level
  - Half have family incomes that qualify for Medicaid and free/reduced meal programs
  - Over 62% live in households isolated by language barriers

Today's bookmobile is the primary library for District 131 students (and the digital library will be too.)



In 2017/18, 350 lunches were provided at the Plum Park bookmobile stop in partnership with Northern Illinois Foodbank.



### The digital bookmobile will cost \$400,000\*



The campaign goal is \$400,000. Additionally, we plan to establish an endowment for the digital bookmobile's maintenance, materials and new technology.



The digital bookmobile will have demonstration/interactive space for STEM (Science Technology Engineering Math) learning. The design will incorporate features like exterior scene lights and speakers, wireless PA, and on-board elements that will set in motion knowledge, information and ideas.

#### How does the bookmobile make a difference in people's lives?

If a person is to reach his/her full potential,education is essential. Aurora's bookmobile services extend educators' resources for home/public/private schooling. Its flexibility to deliver services augments education and workforce infrastructures in our city. Research from child development experts like the Erikson Institute confirm that children in lower income households lose more skills when school is not in session than children from middle/high income households. The bookmobile reaches at-risk children and families. Moreover, visiting senior citizens is a core service of the bookmobile. Many older people are not able to visit APL's main library or branches so we bring the library to them. Page four of the case statement lists other constituents who benefit from bookmobile services including immigrants who may need help acclimating to America, adults in need of their General Education Diploma and our homeless residents. The digital bookmobile will continue making a difference in these ways and others with greater technology and space options! #### Why are donations needed to purchase the digital bookmobile?

APL's budget is comprised mainly of property taxes. In Aurora, 2.9 % of your property tax is allocated to APL. With this budget, ongoing operational needs are included but not the plan, design and construction.

#### Does the bookmobile (and will the digital bookmobile) serve the entire city?

Yes, it does and in many different ways. The bookmobile partners/collaborates with school districts to help children discover, create, connect and succeed. School collections are supplemented by the bookmobile which delivers additional resources for learning, homework and projects. Storytimes in parks, farmers markets and restaurants like Panera Bread keep children reading and learning while having fun. The bookmobile is a library and it provides traditional library services like issuing library cards, answering reference questions and assisting with databases. Also the bookmobile is at festivals, community events, parades and other places throughout our city.

#### Why don't people go to the main library or branches?

Barriers like transportation, language, work schedules and residential locations may prohibit people from visiting Santori Library or the branches.

#### What is the timing for the digital bookmobile and when will we see a rendering?

The plan, design and construction will take approximately 18 months. As soon as we have a rendering, we will let you know!

#### How do teachers use the bookmobile to support early literacy?

APL's School Success and Early Literacy librarians work in tandem with the bookmobile, school librarians and educators to promote, encourage and provide programming and materials for early literacy. Moreover, teachers may (and they do!) request materials from APL. We gather the materials, deliver them to the school and pick them up. The bookmobile also supports teachers by providing reading materials beyond what their school libraries can provide. It enables the schools to focus their small book budgets on curriculum, while the bookmobile brings enrichment and recreational reading.

#### What are the current bookmobile stops?

#### Are grants are available for a digital bookmobile?
